

**MON** June 20

Ch. 103) David sings the disposition of God in this Psalm verses 8-11. What enlightenment does this verse give you?

Ch. 104) This poem is about the amazing providence of God, the Creator, who creates all things in the universe and governs them one by one. For whom the following creations were made?

- 1) springs (verses 10-12):
- 2) trees (verses 16-17):
- 3) high mountains (v. 18):
- 4) the crags (v. 18):

Ch. 105) In this psalm, the poet looks back on the days of Abraham until entry into Canaan and gives thanks for the grace of God that was revealed in it. Find and write verse that show that it was not by chance that Joseph was sold as a slave by his brother, but in God's plan.

Ch. 106) In this psalm, the poet is looking back and repenting of the sins of Israel from the time of the Exodus to the Age of the Wilderness and the life of Canaan. In verse 44-45, despite their sins, "but" what did God do?

"Yet he took (\_\_\_\_\_) of their distress when he (\_\_\_\_\_) their cry; for their sake he (\_\_\_\_\_) his covenant and out of his great love he (\_\_\_\_\_)."

**TUE** June 21

Ch. 107) This poem is a song about God's mercy and salvation with the joy and emotion of liberation from the Babylonian captivity. The same words are repeated three times in this poem. Write those words down.

Ch. 108) This psalm is a psalm of David, who is sure of God's salvation. "For great is your love, higher than the (\_\_\_\_\_); your faithfulness reaches to the (\_\_\_\_\_)."

Ch. 109) This psalm is a poem of David for a prayer for the evil deeds of the wicked and a curse on them (verses 1-20), and a prayer for the suffering and salvation of the righteous (21-31). How does David deal with those who oppose him? (Hint verses 2-4)

Ch. 110) This psalm is David's Messianic prophecy, written with a powerful and majestic feeling. Matthew 22:41-46 says, "David, in the (\_\_\_\_\_), called Christ (\_\_\_\_\_)." In this sense, if we read verse 1 again, "The LORD (Jehovah God) says to my lord (Christ/Jesus), You (Jesus) sit at my right hand until I make your (Jesus) enemies a footstool for your feet."

**WED** June 22

Ch. 111) This psalm praises God's marvelous act of giving grace to His people. What does the poet say is the beginning of wisdom?

Ch. 112) This psalm sings the blessings that those who fear the Lord will receive. Write down the blessings that will come to those who fear the Lord and greatly delight in his commandments.

Ch. 113) This psalm is a poem that praises God who stooped down. Write down what God did when He stooped down.

Ch. 114) This poem is about the sovereignty of God over all things in nature. What does the phrase "The sea looked and fled" in this poem refer to? (Hint verse 1)

**THU** June 23

Ch. 115) This poem is a hallelujah praise poem. In this psalm, write to whom three times the phrase "trust in the LORD!" is emphasized. (Hint verses 9-11)

Ch. 116) This psalm is a testimony of thanksgiving for God's salvation. What did the poet pray when the cords of death entangled him, when the anguish of the grave came over, and when he was overcome by distress and sorrow?

Ch. 117) This psalm is the shortest psalm in the Psalms, and it is a hymn poem (worship poem) that is sung at the beginning of praise at the assembly. Write verse 2. "I Praise the LORD, all you nations; extol him, all you peoples."

Ch. 118) This psalm is a song sung on Hebrew feast days as worshipers go up to the temple. Following 115:9-11, in this psalm v. 2-4, what confession must Israel, the house of Aaron, and those who fear the Lord make?

**FRI** June 24

Ch. 119) This psalm is the longest chapter in the entire Bible with 176 verses. In particular, there are 8 verses in each of the 22 alphabets of Hebrew, and it is structured into 176 verses. The theme of this psalm is "blessings to those who love the law of the LORD."

1) How can a young man purify his conduct?

2) Where did the poet put the words of the LORD in order not to sin against God?

3) Why did the poet say that suffering is good for him?

4) Your word is (.....) for my feet and (.....) on my path.  
- This means that the Word of God is the standard for my feet, that is, in our life now, and on my path, that is, on our path forward.

**SAT** June 25

Ch. 120) Psalms 120-134 are 'a song of going up to the temple', and this poem is a poem that appeals to God's judgment on the wicked. With whom does the poet regret having lived for a long time?

Ch. 121) Looking at Mount Zion and mountains surrounding the holy city of Jerusalem, this poem is confident and grateful that only God is the true protector and helper. "I lift up my eyes to the mountains— where does my help come from?" Find and write the answer to this question.

Ch. 122) This psalm prays for the glory and well-being of Jerusalem before the pilgrims return home. Why did tribes of the LORD, or people of the LORD, go up to the temple according to the custom of Israel? (With what kind of heart should we prepare for worship?)

Ch. 123) This psalm is a prayer psalm asking for God's mercy. To what does the poet compare the heart of waiting for the LORD God to show him His mercy?

Ch. 124) This psalm is a psalm of David that sings of God who delivered salvation from danger. What did David, who was saved from his adversary, compare himself to?
