Ch. 3) In this chapter, the bride who longs for the groom even in her dreams and the groom coming to pick up the bride through the rough fields are sung. How does the bride describe the groom she is looking for? (The words are repeated four times in verses 1, 2, 3, 4)

Ch. 4) This chapter is the groom's song of joy sung to the bride preparing for the wedding. Complete Solomon's love confession to the Shulamite woman.
