

MON) June 24**Ch. 97 - A psalm of hope and joy for the coming of the kingdom of God**

The writer first says that the whole world should rejoice at God's reign (v. 1), and verses 4-6 show the results that God's reign will have on the entire earth. In verse 10, "you who love the Lord" refers to the saints. God will sow (.....) for the righteous and (.....) for those who are upright in heart. (vv. 10-11)

Ch. 98 - Praise and worship to the King who judges the whole world

The writer states that the wonders of God's work and the grace of salvation that God has given for His glory are the subject of praise (verses 1-3). In this psalm, what are the instruments used to praise God?

Ch. 99 - Praise for God's Reign

God reigns; let the people tremble, and let the earth quake (v. 1). The writer mentions Moses, Aaron, and Samuel, the three men who stood as mediators between the Israelites and God in the Old Testament (v. 6). God answered their prayers, and he was God who disciplined the people for their evil deeds. With the discipline, God also (.....) them? (V. 8)

Ch. 100 - A song to sing when going to worship God

This psalm is a song to be sung when one goes to worship God, or when one completes one's life and enters heaven to see the eternal God.

"Know that the Lord, he is God! It is he who (.....) us, and we are his; we are his (.....), and the (.....) of his pasture."

Ch. 101 - A Psalm of David - A psalm containing the decision David made before God when he ascended to the throne as king

In this psalm, how does David confess that he will act as a ruler, even at home?

TUE) June 25**Ch. 102 - A prayer for a sufferer who is brokenhearted and pours out his sorrow before the Lord**

Looking at the content of the psalm, the suffering is not personal, but seems to refer to the suffering of God's people Israel. If so, this psalm may be a prayer of a believer seeking God's grace when the kingdom of God (for example, the church) is in trouble. God regards the prayer of the (.....) (v. 17), and will come to HIS people and restore them when the (.....) has come (v. 13)

Ch. 103 - David's Psalm - a hymn from one who remembers grace

In this psalm, David looks back on the past and praises God through his testimony of faith. How does David praise God in the first and last verses?

Ch. 104 - Praise the God of creation and providence

This psalm is a meditation on God, who created heaven and earth and provides providence, and praises God's greatness. All living things live by God's grace, and they all look to God "give them their food in (.....)."

Ch. 105 - Praise the God of salvation

Psalm 104 is a hymn sung while meditating on the creation of heaven and earth. Psalm 105 is a hymn sung while meditating on God's work of salvation of Israel. The psalm recounts the history of Abraham, Jacob, and Joseph and the Exodus by Moses, and thanks the faithful and loving God. The purpose of God calling Israel out of Egypt was, "that they might keep his (.....) and observe his (.....). Praise the Lord!"

WED) June 26**Ch. 106 - Faithful God's Unfaithful People**

Psalm 105 focuses on God's work of salvation. Psalm 106 focuses on Israel's disobedience to God and lack of faithfulness to the covenant. "Nevertheless," God "heard their (.....). For their sake he (.....) his covenant, and (.....) according to the abundance of his steadfast love. He caused them to be (.....) by all those who held them captive." (vv. 44~46)

Ch. 107 - A hymn by the one who experiences God's kindness in adversity

This psalm sings of God's kindness and work of salvation, for He lead Israel out of captivity in Babylon. Here, what is the reason for which people sit in darkness and under the shadow of death and are bound by hardship and chains?

Ch. 108 - David's Psalm of Praise, confident in God's salvation

The first half of the psalm (1-5) is similar to verses 57:7-11, and the second half (6-13) is similar to verses 60:5-12. Why does David promise to rely on God and act courageously no matter what the situation? (Verse 13)

Ch. 109 - David's response to his enemies who sought his life

A psalm written when David was under threat by many enemies that attacked David without cause and with evil, lying tongues and hateful words. (vv. 1-3) How does David respond? (v. 4)

Ch. 110: A prophetic psalm about the Messiah

This is a psalm of prophecy quoted in the New Testament as follows:

1) Jesus (Matthew 22:42-45, Mark 12:35-37, Luke 20:41-44), 2) the apostles (Acts 2:34-36, 1 Corinthians 15:25), 3) Hebrews (Hebrews 1:13; 7:17)

It shows that Jesus who achieved redemption on the cross, rules the whole world, as its King, through the Church.

"The LORD says to my Lord; Sit at my (.....), until I make your enemies your footstool."

THU) June 27**Ch. 111 - A psalm that teaches that God's people must know Him.**

"The (.....) of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom; all those who practice it have a good understanding. His (.....) endures forever!"

Ch. 112 - Blessings of those who fear God and delight in his commandments

Psalms 111 and 112 sing about God's glory and His works. Psalm 112 sings about how God's glory and His works are revealed to people. Find and write at least two blessings that will come to those who fear the Lord and delight in His commandments.

Ch. 113 - Who is like our God?

In this psalm, the writer praises God who humbled Himself to look down on the heavens and the earth.

Ch. 114 - Song of Exodus

The writer recalls the parting of the Red Sea during Exodus and the parting of the Jordan River when entering Canaan (verses 3, 5). It is important for God's children to often meditate on the grace of God that led to their salvation. Take time to look back and reflect on God's salvation for you.

Ch. 115 - A psalm glorifying God while living pagans who worship idols

The writer records how Gentiles create and worship idols, robbing God of glory due only to Him. What is the reason that the writer repeatedly tells "Israel, house of Aaron, those who fear The Lord" to trust in God?

FRI) June 28**Ch. 116 - Three decisions of those who have received grace**

David Dixon viewed the contents of this psalm as three resolutions of gratitude for God's saving grace.

- 1) The decision to pray with a loving heart and trust only in God (verses 1-2)
- 2) The decision to live in front of people, but in the sight of God (verse 9)
- 3) It is a decision not to stop praising and serving in order to repay the vows made during difficult times (verses 14-19).

For the rest of our lives, may our prayers and wishes be to love God, to pray, to live before God's eyes, and to serve God.

Ch. 117 - The Lord's lovingkindness and truth

The writer calls upon (.....) to praise God (v. 1). The content of praise is a confession that "For great is his (.....) toward us, and the (.....) of the Lord endures forever."

Ch. 118 - A king's hymn expressing gratitude to God for salvation and victory in war.

This psalm is a celebration and thanksgiving to the Lord for salvation and victory. In particular, how does the writer begin and end the psalm?

Ch. 119 - The Law of the Lord

This psalm is the longest chapter not only in the Book of Psalms, but in the entire Bible. Eight verses are recorded for each of the 22 Hebrew alphabets, and a total of 176 verses. The psalm contains various expressions for the Word of God (law, testimony, statutes, statutes, commandments, words, and ways). As you read psalm 119, write down a phrase that stands out to you.

SAT) June 29***Psalms 120-134 Songs of Ascent to the Temple*****Ch. 120 - Deliver me from lying lips.**

The writer regrets having lived for a long time with those who hate peace (verses 5-6), and prays to be delivered from their (.....) and (.....). (Verse 2)

Ch. 121 - The Lord is your protector

Let's read this psalm and sing the praise, "The Lord is your keeper; the Lord is your shade on your right hand."

Ch. 122 - Let's go up to the house of the Lord

"I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the (.....) of the Lord!'"
The House of the Lord means the Temple in Jerusalem. The writer loved the Temple and loved God.

Ch. 123 - Lord, be gracious to us

The writer compares the longing for The Lord God to give grace to what? (Verse 2)

Ch. 124 - If the Lord had not been on our side

A psalm of David praising God for saving him from danger. Who is our help?

Ch. 125 - Those who trust in The Lord

The writer compares the safety of those who trust in the Lord to what?

Ch. 126 - Like a dream

Here, the psalm states that when the Lord returned the captives, the writer felt that it was a dream. How did the surrounding nations say?

Ch. 127 - Solomon's Psalm

This psalm deals with the futile efforts of those who are not with God. What should we remember in our daily lives of waking up early, lying down late, and eating the bread of our labor? (Verse 1)
