1st Week

Day 1

Genesis Ch. 1

The Israelites first heard about God's creation through Moses after the Exodus. At that time, they were deeply entrenched in Egyptian idolatry, worshipping the sun, moon, stars, animals, and rivers. God's creation story taught the Israelites that all creation was under the dominion of the Creator God. The creation and created world described in chapter one are God's masterpiece, perfectly reflecting God's good will, as evidenced by the repeated phrase 'God (.....).'

Everything we see outside, our children, and even ourselves were declared 'very good' by God.

Ch. 2

As human beings, created in the image of God, we are meant to live in relationship with Him by obeying His commandments. In the best environment provided by our good God, we were meant to live in satisfaction within the Word of God. In 2025, may our family, church, and places of our living be blessed by God to live within the Word of God, just like Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. We pray in the name of Jesus.



Day 2

Ch. 3

Adam and Eve, the first humans, were not satisfied with their perfect life in the Garden of Eden. They thought there were better things and greater happiness to be found (such as becoming like God) and believed that they could somehow improve their lives on their own. However, this was a delusion that we are all susceptible to, and it was the beginning of sin. Sin caused us to lose everything. What were the consequences of the sin that Adam and Eve faced? (Verse 24)

Ch. 4

This chapter, following the account of people breaking their relationship with God and committing sin in chapter 3, shows how they subsequently break their relationships with each other. Lamech, a descendant of Cain, commits two sins. Find out what these sins are.

1. The beginning of polygamy (verse 19):

Day 3

Ch. 5

Chapter 5 presents the genealogy of Adam's descendants. The repetitive phrase 'and he died' clearly shows that death is an undeniable reality for all people, and it is the result of sin. However, even amidst this relay of death, there is hope. Through (.....), who walked with God and was taken away without seeing death, we see hope that those who walk with God can expect victory even amidst the curse of death (verse 24).

Ch. 6

Seeing that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and every intention of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually, the LORD regretted that He had made man on the earth, and it grieved Him to His heart. (v. 5-7) What kind of was Noah (v. 9), who found favor in the eyes of the LORD amid the judgment against a wicked generation (v. 8)?

We pray that, even in the midst of a life where the tide of wickedness is overwhelming and it is so difficult to follow God's goodness, we may become wise individuals who can make right choices and decisions, just as Noah did, by obeying God's word until the end.

Day 4

Ch. 7

Chapter 7 depicts the climax of the flood judgment. Noah, his family, and the animals entered the ark. The sole reason Noah could enter the ark was that God declared, 'for I have seen that you are (.....) before me in this generation' (verse 1), signifying that righteousness before God was the only condition for entering the ark. Moreover, Noah (.....) all that the LORD had commanded him. (verse 5). We too desire to live as righteous believers, obedient to God like Noah. Anticipating the day when the flood ends and the ark comes to rest, let us trust in the Lord and live today even amidst a shaking ark.

Ch. 8

The turning point of the flood judgment is the phrase, "God (.....) Noah and all the beasts and all the livestock that were with him in the ark." (verse 1). It wasn't simply due to the natural order that the flood subsided, and the waters receded; it was because God remembered. Even when life seems like an endless flood, we believe that God remembers and watches over us. Just as Noah worshipped God first after the flood, may we live as worshippers in every moment, and may we trust and believe in God even more.
